FORTY-TWO BAPTIZED



St. Kitts: After three weeks of evangelistic services, forty-two individuals responded to the transformational message of God's love and power and were added to the Seventh-day Adventist Church in St. Kitts, through baptism. The mass baptism took place on Sabbath, November 17, 2012 at the Frigate Bay Beach in St. Kitts; it was the first baptism on the first Sabbath celebration of the Power in the Blood Gospel Extravaganza.

In a brief interview, Evangelist for the Extravaganza, Pastor Sherwin A.E. White, humbly expressed his gratitude for the individuals who publicly committed their lives to God.

"I am happy that folk responded positively to the call of Christ. As an evangelist, I have seen many more being baptized in a first baptism and I have seen less. Forty-two is a good first harvest. I 1

am filled with gratitude and my focus is to make sure that all those who have surrendered to Christ continue to walk with Him. I am committed to proclaiming the unadulterated word of God; this is my assignment. I am leaving the transformation of hearts to the Holy Spirit."

Among the forty-two baptized, Ms. Kishma Liburd, shared her joy in being newly baptized. "Satan is seeking to devour the young people of this world and I do not want to be a part of that. I want to serve God. I was baptized because I realized that the world has nothing to offer. God is the only way to live a fulfilling, happy and just life. I now feel joyous, free and richly blessed."

The baptism was preceded by a morning's service that was packaged with inspirational and uplifting musical

Also, inspiring testimonies highlighted the power of God in the lives of Adventist members and brief addresses were made on "Sabbath Keeping", "Stewardship", "Christian Conduct: Modesty" and "The Spirit of Prophecy" by Elder Floyd Revan of the Zion Seventh-day Adventist Church, Pastor

Prince Harris of Antigua and Barbuda, Pastor Kay White, Pastor of District Two, St. Kitts and Elder Myron Percival of the Molineux Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Evangelist Pastor Sherwin White indicated that the Extravaganza is scheduled to continue for two more weeks and baptismal services will be held on the two remaining Sabbaths. He additionally pinpointed that the crusade team is prepared to conduct additional services if it becomes necessary.

SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS AWARDED IN NEVIS' 100 MEN'S AWARDS



Nevis: Monday, November 19, was celebrated as International Men's Day worldwide. As part of the activities to celebrate this significant day, Voices of Women (VOW) held a very significant ceremony at the Red Cross Headquarters on Chapel Street, Nevis.

The ceremony was held in order to celebrate 100 men of Nevis. The ceremony commenced with prayer by Canon Ernest Flemming, followed by the national anthem sung by all present. The huge gathering was warmly welcomed by Chairperson Mrs. Nicole Lawrence. She then asked for a minute's silence in honour of the late former Premier of Nevis, Simeon Daniel, who was originally on the list of the 100 men to be honoured but had since died.

President of the Association, Sister Gwenneth Browne, then addressed the gathering and warmly congratulated the honourees telling them that it was their 'time to shine.'

Featured speaker for the afternoon's proceedings was Pastor Jerry Languedoc of the Seventh-day Adventist Church on Nevis. He congratulated the VOW team for taking such an initiative to honour the men.

Using a previously used quotation, he admonished and challenged the men to:

- 1) Improve their life expectancy—by getting regular medical checkups, eating right; exercising and getting involved in other similar healthy lifestyle habits;
- 2) Improve education- He noted that women were normally more motivated to seek after higher-learning;
- 3) Put a stop to violent behaviour and practising anger management;
- 4)Be a role model for younger ones to follow.

Another instructive address was delivered by Mr. Hensley Daniel, Special Advisor to Premier of Nevis, Honourable Joseph Parry, who apologized for the absence of Premier Parry who was otherwise engaged.

Antigua: It was indeed a service fit for a diamond celebration as hymns of thanksgiving and Psalms of praise filled the Parham Seventh-day Adventist Church. The grand occasion was in recognition of the Women of Excellence Awards 10th Anniversary.

This special service, hosted by the Antigua Seventhday Adventist Women's Ministries Association, was held under the theme, "Thanksgiving." The Praise Team set the tone for the service.

Words of welcome were offered by Genevieve Browne. Olive Gardener approached the throne of grace while Sherry-Ann Henry read Psalm 136.

In her greetings, Women's Ministries Assistant Island Co-ordinator, Christine Steele, made a clarion call for women, especially mothers, to become a part of the ministry.

The feature presentation was well delivered and received. Mrs. Carolyn Heskey told the gathering that God showers us with blessings we do not deserve and in amounts we cannot measure. These blessings – which we receive through Christ – she likens to a cornucopia basket of gifts. weapon against the enemy. The third gift in the basket is **prayer** – the wonderful privilege of continuous access to the throne room where we can find help in the time of need. Next, was **salvation** which is graciously wrapped in Christ's righteousness gridded with truth, peace and faith. These, she admonished, were "our spiritual weapons" with which to defend against the enemy.

Among the other potpourri of blessings are **patience** and longsuffering. According to Mrs. Heskey, "God gives us time to see ourselves as we are, so we can see our weakness and un-Christ-like selves," thus allowing us the opportunity to ask God to mold and fashion us after His will.

ELIZABETH ROMEO, A MONTSERRAT MISSIONARY



Elizabeth Romeo

Montserrat: After the volcanic eruption in 1995, Sister Elizabeth Romeo, moved to the United Kingdom.

In London she belongs to the Hampstead SDA church where a number on Kenyans attend.

During and Education Day, one of the Kenyans testified that his family was extremely poor, he went on to explain that such was his thirst to obtain a formal education that he went to school naked. His father could just manage to scrape together his tuition fees but not enough for cloths as well.

Mrs. Romeo decided to travel to Kenya to obtain first hand information about the needs of the underprivileged children there. Having experienced herself the dire situation of majority of the people in Kenya, Mrs. Romeo felt that she could then make a practical Christian response to the problem.

ELIZABETH ROMEO, A MONTSERRAT MISSIONARY



In 1998, she initiated the Children Ministries Programme that was given the name *Good Health* for Africa (GoHFA) in 2004. The programme was to do five main things: 1) Prevent and relieve poverty; 2) Provide Education for the children; 3) Provide proper and free health facilities; 4) Help the community to develop economically; 5) Provide clean water for drinking and household purposes.

Khayegais a small town in the district of Kakamega with a population of over one million. The main source of income comes from growing maize. However most of the population do not own or have access to enough land to grow sufficient food to feed their families, and at the same time have enough to sell and to obtain an income.

Mrs. Romeo was moved when she saw the suffering of the children as a result of disease such as Aids, Malaria, Typhoid, dental problems and various forms of serious skin diseases. The impact of Aids on the family life is devastating often resulting in orphan hood, homelessness, hunger and crime. The lack of basic care for pregnant mothers, babies and the mentally ill was moving. Mrs. Romeo saw a great need for adult education, for example literacy, numeracy, food production and basic life skills.

Over the past ten years Mrs. Romeo and her

GoHFA team with the help of sponsorship and contributions were able to: Create a multipurpose primary school with 8 classrooms, a staff room and an office. The school is now established as a church. Two other Sabbath Schools have also been established. There is a Pathfinder Club which is integrated into the school programme from Kindergarden to Grade Ten. There were also purchases of school furniture, a van and school uniforms for the children. Additionally, accommodations were provided for some of the staff. The school has a roll of 390 students and each child is given two hot meals a day, for some it's the only meal they will get. Also, there is a vegetable garden in the school which is used to supply the kitchen.


The Donald Romeo Academy placed number two in the KCPE exams for the district, it was also named best private school in the district, and during the tribal troubles it was the only operating school in the district.

The school is an on-going project and depends on donations to survive, it only costs \$2.00 EC a day to feed a child.

How secure is my investment?

Investment funds are loaned to local churches, conferences, missions, ABCs, schools, universities, hospitals, and are secured by the assets of the local field or Union. Strict guidelines are observed to make sure that the congregation, institution or field can sustain such loan payments.

The fund is also required to maintain a reserve of the principal balance which would be expressed as a percentage of the investment obligations. The fund is also secured by the Caribbean Union Conference

What are some of the options for use of the interest on investment?

The Fund will process these payments according to your written instructions, otherwise, earned interest income will be reinvested.

How can I learn more about investment opportunities in C.U.R.F.?

Personnel from your local conference, institution or the Caribbean Union Revolving Fund are available to provide materials and conduct seminars so that you can make informed decisions about investment opportunities and long-term financial planning.

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
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CARIBBEAN UNION REVOLVING FUND



What is the Caribbean Union Revolving Fund (C.U.R.F)?

C.U.R.F. is a non profit organization established by the Caribbean Union Conference Executive Committee. The fund handles savings, loans, and investments via the Revolving Fund, also known as C.U.R.F. (Caribbean Union Revolving Fund).

Participation in the Revolving Fund is open to all Caribbean Union Constituents, and allows you to invest your money at a good interest rate, while at the same time assisting the church to finance churches, schools and institutions. (e.g. educational, medical, ABC) in the Union.

What investment opportunities are available from C.U.R.F.?

C.U.R.F. Offers four investment options:

- 1. Revocable Trust Instruments.
- 2. Flexible Demand Deposits (one-year to three-year term investments).
- ▶3. Long-term savings and wealth preservation.
- ▶4. Fixed Deposits.

How is interest established?

The interest is determined periodically by the Board of Management, taking into consideration the duration of the investment, the amount invested, the purpose of the investment and the current market rate paid on similar

Why should we invest long term?

Some churches and institutions have developed their long term goals and should begin now to make deposits/investments so that when needed, such funds can be accessed to facilitate those plans. The earlier you start investing, the more realizable those goals become.

Any Seventh-day Adventist local church, conference, mission, school, book centre, hospital, university, credit union and other Seventh-day Adventist organizations or institutions.
